The end came to Admiral Jean Francols Darian, the Viehy Vacillator, in the
midst of his last great act of collaboration. His return to the camp of the

out his life and dropped the black curfash on as strange a player as the stage
of the twentleth century has seen. The

Over the laboring world, the Admiral's death will not be greatly mourned. Long before President Roosevelt branded him sea temporary expedient, a pawn in an early stage of battle, the nations at war knew his new role for what it was. It was too clearly something out of his past of pandering, glibly shifting as power shifted. The man's life had been a thing of bowing and scraping, of boot-

a thing of bowing and scraping, of boot-lekking. He was not destined to play a major role in the conquest of the world. But all the same, a valuable ally lies dead in Algiers. In his brief moment as a tool of the United Nations he had brought a new empire under our arms—and caused a British-American furore that raged from Parliament to Congress. Today, the hubbub ceased suddenly. The little fanatic has served his purpose, given his life, and a phase of our war is finished.

There is no knowing, now, whether he died at the hand of the enemy or a flercely patriotic Frenchman, but it matters little. He had left enemies indicating the contraction.

He had left enemies indiscriminately, wherever he traveled, and to the great cause of victory which dwarfs the lives of millions of men, his successor is likely to be of more importance than was Darian himself. It is probable that General Henri Giraud, the old man of miracles, the Boehehater, will assume the slain Admiral's power and position—and his choice could cause only rejoicing in Alled nations. The General has left no puzzling doubts in his wake through two wars.

The death of Jean Darlan, who rose from obscurity to wealth and fame by his policy of collaboration, must be addening to a world knowing the truth of John Donne's line. "For every clod that washes away, Europe is the lesse... Bend not lo know for whom the bell Send not to know for whom the bell tolls. It tolls for thee."

Liquor Trial of Thirteen Pictures Lack of Control

Pictures Lack of Control
The recent full-scale drive against
bootlegging in Chariotte and Mecklenburg County by the combined forces of
the Police Departments, and the subsequent treatment received by thirteen defendants in City Recorder's Court brings
up the old Jack-in-the-box liquor question for the community once more.
Somewhere, between raid and sentence,
law enforcement, has suffered a defeat.
For two or three weeks police officers
planned their coup, and, stratery and
tactics being sound, they made a good
hauf of alleged violators. That, presumably, should have about cleaned up the
counts. We have no doubt that the
Police were chaprined when the thirteen

Police were chaprined when the thirteen left the court room with seven suspended sentences, three acquittals, two continued prayers for judgment, one payment of costs, \$75 in fines, plus cost, and a total of three and a half years on the roads, suspended.

Policemen probably felt that courts, which should share an even greater responsibility in Jaw enforcement than officers of the law, could break down the whole system: that Department morale suffered from such sethacks.

More than a third of the Police Department's calls come from reported liquor-law violations, and it follows that the city might as well demiss a third of the Department it doesn't want hard and fast control.

He, naturally, would not agree that his sentences were too light (and, by the way, neither would the sweets defendants who appealed their suspended sentences). It seems to us that

a suspended sentence hanging over a bootlegger's head is more likely to drive him out of business than the simple paying of a heavy fine—after which he would walk out, free to resume his trade.

For, though sentences from Recorder's Court may be appealed, and lost or de-layed in Superior Court, suspended sentences automatically go into effect when

tences automatically go into effect when a violator returns to court on a similar charge. That fact alone seems to speak for the light sentences upon the thitten, but such a technical consideration is beside the issue. The question is one for the people of the community to decide; it cannot be settled at all between police and judiciary. The liquor laws are on the books, but their enforcement remains in question — the City of Charlotte electorate having shown lits sentlinent against them by ballot. Here is a short circuit in local government. It must be circuit in local government. It must be decided whether violations of the liquor laws will be punished; otherwise the efforts of the whole enforcement system are, to a large degree, wasted.

IF. THEN, we review the history of the relations between Hiller and the Officers' Corps of the Germany army, we see that it has always represented a potential menne to him.
