Scarcity's New Habits

WASHINGTON ONE source of much trouble in war production is the fact that the Army and Navy have had to switch from abundance to scarcity.

That is, before the war, we had an abundance of every kind of material. There was aluminum everywhere.

Now aluminum is short. The Navy has had to change its requirements so that perhaps it uses a quarter less aluminum in a ship than before.

Abundant materials, plenty of time, and small quantities, led to hand-tailoring methods, to luxury trimmings, to refinements, to use of scarce materials.

Super Taxes

They Produce Almost Enough To Support the New Deal

Only those citizens who have already paid down and figured out their income tax damage for this March 15 can take in the awful import of Secretary Morgenthau's recommendations to Congress yesterday.
