Therefore, he declares:

"I think it is much better that we are adapting so many smaller industrial plants to all types of war, production than it would be to have this effort concentrated in a few huge plants."

There is no reason why North Carolina should not convert its smaller plants to war production and on top of that get the big plants too. The Governor is using the old rhetorical trick of assuming that the two types of production are alternatives, when as a matter of fact, they complement each other.

Conversion of the automobile industry is perhaps the greater industrial dislocation in the history of mankind, and certainly one of the most rapid. Dislocations also occur during peace time, as in the terrible "bottom years" of the last depression. tom years" of the last depression.
