German Training Designed To Make Norway Ready For Attack

BERN, Switzerland.—(AP)—Espionage and German troops have been erected along the Norwegian Coast in the past year. The same paper's correspondent at Vichy said the order of Pierre Laval banning demonstrations of a "daring" "public order" and fixing the death penalty for unauthorized possession of firearms and explosives was probably inspired by discussions of a second front rather than recent outbreaks in the unoccupied area.

Guzman first met Takahashi in Chicago in 1932 where he received both money and aid from the Jap. Guzman is being held, at present, on draft evasion charges. Takahashi was "picked up" by Detroit immigration officials in 1939 for illegal entry into the country and at the time of his arrest (in 1939) had large quantities of "anti-white" literature in his possession. The Jap is said to have headed an organization called the "Society for the Development of Our Own" with a membership of 10,000 anti-whites in four Michigan cities.

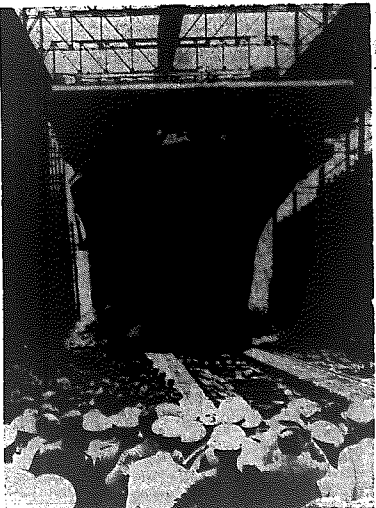
