Thomas Mann Knows Remedy For The German War-Makers

For The German War-Makers

The great author, Thomas Mann, who likely understands his German people as well as any living man, raps for the attention of Americans. He sees the German nation as on the brink of collapse, though economically able to hold out for another year of war. And he says plathly that his race must be controlled by force, and nothing less. He speaks for an organization of world powers based on world law—for the first time.

And then he makes again the searching statement on humanity which has been the theme of a long line of free-thinking men through the ages:

"Was causant expect for much at

Americans who helped defeat the League of Nations as a great power put their faith in the human race; they ex-pected too much. If peace is to be ap-proached on no other basis, a world order must seem rational from this angle
