Government Heads Issue Statement

Say Letterhead Misleading

Heads of the Governments of the City of Charlotte and Mecklenburg County today issued a joint statement in which they said a campaign for solicitation of funds being made by the advisory committee for Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court for the National Probation Association does not have official sanction and is in no way connected with either Government.

The statement, made by County Chairman Ed Middleton and Mayor Herbert Baxter, was as follows: "It has come to our attention that the advisory committee for Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court is attempting to raise funds for the National Probation Association and that the solicitation being made by mail. WAC Re-Enlistment Rate Here Excellent

Opinion Expressed in Washington Discounted by Record in District

The opinion that almost a third of the WAACs would "drop out" when the WAACs become the Women's Army Corps on Sept. 1 as expressed by Washington spokesmen, is discounted in Charlotte among WAAC officers, and they cite the high re-enlistment record of district recruiters and WAACs attached to the woman-power survey now going on here.

Capt. Elizabeth McDonald, district WAAC recruiting officer, said here today that of the enlisted officers and 28 enrolled women attached to the district recruiting force only five enlisted women were re-enlisted; all officers and all enrolled women have been approved for new commissions.

Capt. McDonald said a check among officers and enrolled personnel here to conduct the woman-power survey, revealed that twelve officers and twenty enrolled WAACs had "re-enlisted."

The high regard which WAACs felt for this newest of American Army forces and was also indicative of the confidence with which prospective WAACs can enter the service.

OPA Says Steaks Sold At \$1 Pound

Hearing Set For Aug. 12

Dorwin's Food Store, 1440 E. Morehead St., was accused today by the Office of Price Administration of profiteering in meats, and the OPA announced that the store is prohibited from dealing in all rationed commodities and all commodities which may hereafter be rationed.

OPA Presenting Attorney charged that the store sold steaks at \$1.00 a pound, while the maximum price is \$0.85 a pound.

The Government charged that the store had sold beef and lamb at above market prices between last June 21 and July 27.

Attorney Kild said in the complaint, which was filed by John D. Shaw, chief of the legal staff of the OPA office, that the store violated Federal regulations falling to post notices of price ceilings.

Specifically, the Government charged that on June 27, the store offered to sell Mrs. A. M. Clayton round steak at \$1.00 a pound and a clerk there was shown the price card.

The Government said that the store had a half pound of steak (bone in) in the store and paid \$1.00 for it.

Under these laws the stamps must be placed on the windshield of the motor vehicle, and all vehicles operated this month must display a stamp.

Incidentally a count of automobiles and trucks parked on W. Trade St. between the Post Office and Independence Square showed only 23 cars displaying the stamps out of 50 parked cars.
