Whose Poland?

In the continuing debate over the settlement of the Russo-Pollsh border, there is accessional reference to the fact that the Eastern territory which Russia instats upon holding as her own belongs to Russia by right of history. Ernest K. Lindley, discussing the Polish problem, comments that Russia has an historical claim to all the territory up to the so-called Curson Line, including that area claimed by Russia in the Ribbentrop-Molotov agreement of 1939.

This question will never be actued on any such basis. As a matter of fact, Poland has historical claim to great areas of Russia and Germany—and in the long, tangied history of Poland there has been so much ewapping of territory back and forth that the skein could never be untangled. Just by way of aktimning the subject, Poland was partitioned in 1712, 1793, 1795, 1807, 1813 and 1848. And in all of those divisions. Russia, advanced her border almost as far Wet as Warsaw—and Frussia and Alastria squeezed Poland from North-rounding the capital alone remained.

After the last war, and before the Alles had given sanction. Poland proclaimed herself a new state, and embarked upon new wars to settle her boundaries—with Czechoslovakia, Uk-

rainia, Russia, and Lithuania. The Western world recognized those borders after she had defeated a huge Bolahevist army. Until 1939, Poland had an area of about 150,000 square milee, and over 30,000,000 people.

Under Russia's plan she will lose roughly a quarter of her territory in the East—but likely gain more important holdings in East Prussia. Almost all of the land coveted by Russia is worlthless. Its only large city is kwow, on the border. It is more important to the Poles that they be given means of providing their needs by industry, and thus Frussian cities would mean more to their than Eastement, it is need that the Polish government, the territory it rules, will be friendly to Russia, and will look to Moscow for security. In that sense, Russian borders will be extended all the way to Germany itself.


