Planes Attack German Convoy LONDON.—(AP)—The British air force announced today that 25 or 30 carrier-bomber planes had attacked a German convoy today off the Norwegian coast and acknowledged that two of the Nazi vessels had been destroyed. ... The broadcast asserted, however, that the three were extinguished by fire before they were destroyed. ... There was no immediate report on any such engagement from Allied sources.

Great Air Offensive Continued Bomber Fleet Of 'Medium Strength' By AUSTIN BEALMEAR LONDON.—(AP)—American Fortresses and Liberators, flying in medium strength attacks on the craft production center of Brunswick and other targets in western Germany today without losing a bomber. ... A strong escort of Mustangs, Lightnings and Thunderbolts which made up a total raiding force of probably more than 1,000 planes, also kept the bomber force strongly defended against aircraft production without sighting a single enemy fighter. ... Some of the fighters swept airfields in France with fire, however, and several crews reported heavy anti-aircraft and rocket defenses over Brunswick. ... The Fortresses and Liberators from England, carrying on their ninth operation in the course of a twelve-day offensive which has been the greatest of the war, were bombed by instrument through overcast skies which apparently hampered the enemy's defense. ... Brunswick, on the coast to the German capital, has been one of the bloodiest targets on the books of the United States Strategic Air Force. ... Today's mission, the nineteenth of the Eighth Air Force, while employing over 1,000 planes, was considerably smaller than the 2,000-plane armada that has been directed from Britain in daylight five times since the huge offensive began from Italy on April 15. ... In eleven days this mightiest of air offensives has lambasted the German Luftwaffe with 100,000 tons of explosives and thousands of incendiaries—and cost the Americans 188 bombers and 1,000 crew members and 312 planes. ... Most of the 2,500 men aboard the bombers were taken to safety as prisoners, but that personnel cost was not included in the total. ... The total cost includes about \$50,000,000 in aircraft, probably \$100,000,000 in fuel, and thousands in education expenses of fliers as crewmen, and tremendous amounts in maintenance, wages and dozens of other items involved in hitting the German air force. ... The 312 planes, however, are only slightly more than one per cent of the 30,000 planes in the Luftwaffe in the eleven days, and the Allied command rates this as reasonable.
