Technicians Point To Our Future This Week
The postwar security conference which opened yesterday in Washington is more than a conference; it is to be regarded as the opening phase of the peace settlement. For it is designed to carry forward the plans laid at Tehran, where three basic agreements were reached: 1. An assembly of the United Nations. 2. A executive council, controlled by the Big Four, but including representatives of the smaller nations. 3. A world court.

The men who are meeting at Dumbarton Oaks this week are not the heads of their governments, nor do they hold authority to speak with finality. They are technicians, men who are called upon to make recommendations which will be presented to their governments for approval.
