#### Post-War Navy

The Pacific offensive against Japan for the year starting July 1 is going to cost us \$24,88,000,000 in Navy appropriations alone. We're almost through building our fleets, which are siready far more powerful than the combined navies of the world. And we're cutting naval expenses by \$4,000,000,000 this year.

The Navy wants a post-war force of The Navy wants a post-war force of 1,191 combat ships, plus 4,693 auxiliaries and minor craft. That total (5,830) is nearly three times our pre-war strength—but most of them will not float and patrol, much less fight. All but 482 of those combat ships would be kept on an inactive status, but ready for use on short notice.

The Navy wants to scrap or use as targets over 6,000 other ships fromts of them obsolescent or small stuff, such as landing craft). The admirals add as an afterflought that there are 60,000 other small craft to be disposed of as demobilization proceeds.
