PARIS—(AP)—The Third Army's Fourth Armors
Division plunged 19 miles eastward, raced into the outside
of the old German city of Gotha today, reaching a poin
three-fourths the way across the Reich to Czechoslovaki
and 140 miles from Berlin.

Gotha is 26 miles west of Weimer, birthplace of the German republic installed after the last world war. The town is 75 miles from the border of Czechoslovakia and 75 miles from Leipzig.

FIGHT IN KASSEL

To the northwest of the Gotha spearhead, the Third army was fighting a house to house battle in falling Kassel, occumotive manufacturing center.

In the north, British and Canadian troops advanced within 25 miles or less of the Zuider Zee and within 30 m of the North Sea in the drive to close a trap on the Gerr garrisons of Northern Holland and its V-bomb and rec

The Canadians menaced Arnhem, bridged the Rhine twice and fought toward the Zuider Zes, less imiles away. When they reach the great water mass such as Amsterdam, Rotterdam and The Hague sealed off for liberation.
