Two prisoners and interviewers are taken immediately to place of safety.

Although he seldom expressed himself publicly on the subject, Grew consistently pushed the view that the Allies should not declare themselves in favor of death for Hirohito as abolition of the Japanese monarchy, should not rule out the possibility of negotiating a Japanese surrender with the Emperor.

And it is possible Grew may have been on hand to help see that Hirohito run smoothly after the Emperor takes over in Tokyo and the Allied occupation begins.

Byrnes may reorganize the State Department soon and he may name a new Undersecretary.

OKINAWA—(AP)—A strike of "maximum force" was issued by the people of Japan by the White House announcement that Emperor Hirohito had accepted the Potsdam surrender terms.

For East Air Force bombers which had taken off from Okinawa's airstrip were called back within a few minutes of the radio announcement. The majority of the planes were still on the airways and highways when the order came cancelling all strikes.

OKinawa had an air fleet on its last night of the war. Consequently, there was considerable skepticism this morning when first reports came in that the end of the war had come.

must be continued because of the dangers of inflation.

Snyder asked for a number of legislative acts, including unemployment compensation, revision of the Fair Labor Standards Act, to increase minimum wages, and a program to stimulate production and maintain markets.

For the U. S. Employment Service and retention of this service under Federal control during the interim of transition.

The reconversion chief said "we hope to start planning reconversion in a relatively few months." But he said a full peacetime footing cannot be reached so soon.

At least twelve to eighteen months may be required to reach the expanded peacetime economy which is needed for full employment," he said.

And the construction industry will require even longer, he added.

MAJOR OBJECTIVES

He listed four major economic objectives and said "only a peacetime construction program can do anything to help or hurt the nation."

1. Jobs for all those willing and able to work.

2. A steadily rising standard of living.

3. Stabilization of our economy against inflation or deflation.

4. Increased opportunities for service and industry, and establishment of critical services.

Snyder said there should be no "mining of words" over the severity of the shock which has been suffered by the nation.

He said: "I do not minimize the task ahead of us. The American people have overcome the problems of war. They will overcome the problems of peace."

Explaining his declaration that there are no "big" problems of mass unemployment, Snyder said:

"Labor is determined, business men are determined, farmers are determined, the man in the street and the woman in the home are determined, that we shall put our productive capacity to work producing goods and services."

He announced creation of a "reconversion working committee" composed of deputies from Government departments and the Government works as a team.

He promised that despite the shock of the sudden stoppage of war production, we will not manufacture unemployment.

He said not a single soldier or sailor will be kept in uniform longer than needed in order to get back to civilian life.

He said that the Government is determined to keep the military machine at a level which will insure the nation's defense.
