Is It Ignorance Or Contempt?

ROCK BARILEY, a member of the City School Board, has lodged a formal complaint against the City Police Department's practice of holding prisoners charged with drunkenness incommunicado, and without bond.

The arbitrary four-hour sobering-up period is presumed undertaken in service to the prisoner. The police can argue that any man drunk enough to warrant arrest is in no condition to

make arrangements for his release and would at all probability, be picked up again if he were allowed to personally post bond.

The matter of holding prisoners incommunicado is, of course, indefensible. It serves to block any defense a prisoner might make when finally brought to trial.

The fact that such a practice is condoned in a formal Police Department ruling demonstrates a shocking ignorance of the law, or an equally shocking contempt for it.

Old 42 Moves Up To 14th

NORTH CAROLINA customarily winds up down around 42nd place on the list of states contributing cash money to any given national cause, which is natural enough considering the per capita income average of the state.

We can be reasonably proud of ranking near the top of the list of Southern States (\$125,866 raised in Georgia, \$73,430 in Virginia, \$65,000 in Tennessee, \$3,368 in North Carolina).

A little more than half of North Carolina's contribution will be spent in the State to provide special cancer instruction for general practitioners, to support clinics, and to assist indigent cancer patients.
