NEW YORK, N. Y. The German industrialists—guilty war criminals—will on the way to escape the consequences of their misdeeds?

Justice Robert H. Jackson's recently expressed fear that "German industrialists—one the chief causes of the war—would never be tried for their crimes."

Justice Jackson is reported to have said: "They (the three other prosecutors) believed we could not handle a larger number even if it took somewhat longer, and doubted whether we could go through a second trial repeating much of the same evidence against this new group of defendants."

The four prosecutors at Nuremberg are doing a magnificent job. Thorough, efficient way in which the prosecution is being handled will go down in history as an outstanding example of international co-operation in one of the most critical trials of history.

Yet, at the same time, it is disturbing to note the failure of the four prosecutors to agree on the necessity for trying the German industrialists...

Already Gustav and Alfred Krupp von Bohlen and Halbach have escaped prosecution. It has even been reported in the American press that of the accused at Nuremberg, Hjalmar Schacht, the lone capitalist punishment because "there is not evidence enough to convict him."

Justice Jackson is logical and correct in his argument that a very serious mistake was made, by not trying the German industrialists now.

As for the Administration's political face-juggery without delay. All of Germany's political, economic, scientific, intellectual and industrial leaders who have participated in the preparation and the execution of her war of conquest should be placed before the bar of justice.

WASHINGTON. An important debate has been taking place among food experts inside the Administration regarding the use of horse meat for feeding Europe.

Horse meat is a type of food which Americans know little about. Within Europe it is standard diet and certain countries, especially France and Belgium, have repeatedly informed the United States that they would like to buy more horse meat here.
