WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman has postponed indefinitely the proposed third atomic bomb test at Bikini.

Father Makes Plea

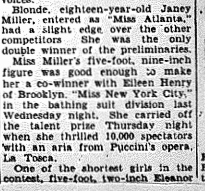
