Lewis Contends No-Strike Injunction Void

Union Brief Filed With High Court

WASHINGTON — (AP) — John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers told the Supreme Court today that the Government's no-strike injunction in the soft coal dispute was void.

The Government also filed a brief with the high court contending that Congress had barred the issuance of restraining orders against unions.

The mine union leader contended in his brief that the Norris-Guardia Act and the Clayton Act prohibit Federal Courts from issuing restraining orders or injunctions against labor organizations.

The Government's brief, signed by Attorney General Tom C. Clark, argued that the policy, purpose, or language of the Norris-Guardia Act is to prohibit such suits.

CHICAGO — (AP) — There appeared good news today for the nation's housewives—retail prices generally are on the way down.

There'll be no more sharp boosts in food prices, virtually all food industry sources said. And a country-wide spot check of representative cities showed that most retail food prices are being marked down than up.

Butter, which at times last year skyrocketed to more than 41¢ a pound in several cities, took another drop in many cities and wholesale prices in markets in Chicago, New York, San Francisco and Los Angeles yesterday showed declines of 1 to 1.2 cents a pound.

Three major food chains in Chicago announced a slash as much as eight cents a pound in retail prices. One chain said it will sell 23¢ more butter at 72 cents a pound today.

Teacher Pay Bill Back In Senate

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House-amended bill providing an increase in pay for teachers and other State employees was placed on the Senate calendar today for possible action Monday night.

A special message to the Senate which met for only three minutes, informed that body that the House had raised the percentage of pay increase provided in the Senate-passed measure from a 20 percent average through all the salary brackets except for employees making less than \$2,000 a year.

The House held a refractory meeting, usual for Saturday mornings during the legislative session, when special business is ordered.

The Senate and House will reconvene Monday after the bill has passed.

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More Money Needed

Representatives Harvey Morris and James B. Vogler pledged themselves today to do all they can to prevent North Carolina's mentally afflicted persons from being overlooked in the present "grab-bag session" of the General Assembly.

Both Members are members of the House committee on mental institutions Mr. Morris, in addition, has a position on the strategic appropriations committee.

Both said they would carry the fight to the floor of the House, if necessary, to see that the institutions get all the money they need to carry on the "best of the best" of the State's temporary wealth, and if we're not careful, these unfortunate people will be overlooked in the mad scramble.

Mr. Vogler and I are determined to prevent that. Mr. Vogler stated that Mr. Morris and the State mental institutions should get first consideration, and said he would take advantage of every opportunity to assure adequate funds for them.

Mr. Morris said he believed \$7,000,000 would be necessary for a building program alone in order to provide space for the hundreds of persons in jails and county homes who have not been able to gain admittance to the institutions.

Mr. Vogler said he would await the report of the budget commission before making up his mind on appropriation. He pointed out that the pending legislation of Camp Butler near Durham, if it goes through, will provide space for 3,500 beds in addition to medical equipment valued at several hundred thousand dollars.

Mr. Morris said he had talked with many members of the General Assembly, and that a strong support for taking care of the State's mental needs is being provided space for the hundreds of persons in jails and county homes who have not been able to gain admittance to the institutions.
