WHEN for nearly twenty years a man heads an organization, especially if thappens to be the large and complex organization that is this newspaper; when heatiles with it through the major trains of war and depression and scarcilites; when he suffers a serious liness, yet returns resolutely to his duties—

And when, in time, finding it imperative that at last he divest himself of his heavy responsibilities, he does so retaining the admiration of the men and women who have been his associates for all or a part of those years—

Why, then, we think it may rightly be said that the man has proven himself in the end, as in the beginning, to have been worthy of his position of leadership and trust, and to have deserved the esteem in which he is held by all who know him.

That no one may be uncertain whom we mean to single out for tribute, we name William Carey Lowd Jr., publisher of The Charlotte News, who in the next day or two gives over to a younger and more vigorous man. It is one of the ironies of his profession that Mr. Diwd should be mentioned in these columns only as he finally severs his life-long connection with Tix News. The laws of modesty and anonymity he has slways observed only now may be suspended to note here the high regard and warm affection his associates have held, and will continue to hold, for him.

THE NEWS, from its founding in 1888 until today, has been a family enterprise, owned first by the elder William Carey Dowd, and later by his children. It has been, always, more of an institution than a business; its owners have regarded it

This hard military fact has shaped international relations not only for this nation and the Soviet, but for all nations. The first, best hope was that the two giants could maintain and improve the degree of co-operation they had achieved in the face of a mutual enemy. giants, authough uncratical patriots in-both countries have never stopped trying. Per-haps it was an inevitable historical process, or an act of God. In any event the thing has happened, and it happened at a time when James Francis Byrnes of South Car-olina represented the Western giant in the council chambers of the world.

Cartainly he has had long practice in bowing to the inevitable: politics, as he successfully practiced it all his life, he called "the art of the possible." Once he had accepted, as the great majority of his countrymen had also accepted, the proposition that genuine co-operation with Communist Russia is impossible, he moved with his customary vigor and skill into the battle

As wartime Chief of Staff he demonstrated a dedication to democratic ideals, and an impressive flexibility of mind. He is one of those Americans who grew great in time of crisis, a man who measured up to the every demand, military and otherwise, made by one of the most exacting assignments in our history.

We may regret the circumstances that make a soldier an acceptable Secretary of State in this time of tentative peace, but we cannot ignore them. And if we must have a military man, Mr. Truman couldn't have selected a better one.
