An 'Ideal' Newspaper For America

A "blueprint" for a better American press comes from nine Nieman Fellows, newspaper men and women who are absorbing the academic atmosphere at Harvard under the Nieman Fund, which was established some years ag o "to promote and elevate the stardards of journalism in the United States and educate persons deemed specially qualified for journalism."

deemed specially quarter for journalism. The blueprint carries the som ew hat, alarming statement that "the press, as we see it, faces two eventualities—responsibility or regulation. If it continues its trend toward concentration of control in the hands of a few people, towards a uniformity of class interest and class expression hardy to be distinguished from total-tarianism, we do not see how it can avoid an eventual reader? revolt and severe restrictions of its rights."

However, as we persued the Nieman Fellows' prescription for an "ideal" newspaper we could not help noticing its striking resemblance to the form and content of dozens of newspapers which we see every day on this deak. "An ideal newspaper", they write, "might perhaps combine the snap and readability of the New York Daily News, the pictorial excellence of Life, the thoroughness of the Times, the crusading fire of the Post-Dis-

pitch, the human interest and intelligence of the Herdid-Tribune, and the sense of responsibility of the Courier-Journal. That would be quite a newspaper!"

We would like to add that all or most of the "ideal" qualities recommended by the Fellows are reflected in varying degrees in a majority of America's daily newspapers. They are, in fact, the standards which the American press long has tried to uphold anowhold in the hast seneration.

There is nothing novel or startling in the blueprint drawn by the Fellows.
