Marshall's Trumps On Germany

SECRETARY MARSHALL apparently is trying for a grand slam in the game on Germany. His strategy at the coming Conference of Foreign Ministers in Londom was indicated when he appeared yesterday before the Senate Foreign Affairs Committee to discuss the European recovery program and called for restoration of the German economy. In projecting the German tracty issue to the forefront of the Marshall Plan discussion he seems to be attempting a double squeeze to get a settlement that will end the partition of Germany.

In thus relating German restoration to the whole recovery program, Mr. Marthall-servel notice on both Russia and France that the United States holds the trumps in this game and they should concede the tricks. For France it is notice that continued obstruction of German economic revival by the French will jeopardize the entire recovery program which the United States is sponsoring and upon which the French are depending so heavily.

open bid, but the point was unmistakable when the Secretary spoke of the fears of some people in Europe that a restored Germany "will again be involved in the destruction of European civilization," and declared they would be dispelled when it becomes apparent that the United States is attempting only to get Europe on its feet. Those words may be construed as reassurance to both France and Russia. In view of the tension between Russia and this country, and the political situation here, the Secretary could not have made a more pointed gesture toward the Soviet. He was surrounded by Republicans who have been talking loudly for a separate

German treaty ann no more truck with the Russians.

Mr. Marshall already has drawn some criticism on the score that he does not give enough interviews and doesn't take the Republicans into his confidence. Some of this unfriendly comment comes from twerps who can't appreciate the magnitude of the task on which the Secretary is concentrating, but mostly it stems from GOP circles that want to close the door to a settlement with Russia even before Mr. Marshall goes to the conference on Germany.
