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Members To Contribute National Political Drive Planned By AFL League

WASHINGTON (AP)—The AFL will before 100 union presidents today a program of nationwide political action calling for voluntary contributions of at least \$1 from each of the 7,500,000 AFL members.

Up to now, the Federation has been pledged to the general objective of "selecting our friends and defeating our enemies," but has taken no concrete political action similar to that of the CIO with its Political Action Committee (PAC).

The plan of organization for Labor's Education and Political League (LEPL) approved by the council calls for a chairman, secretary-treasurer, and 300 taking on the decentralized character of the fifteen members of the executive council would make up half of that committee.

In addition, the presidents of the 105 unions would form another executive committee to carry this effort into effect in each community.

PARIS (AP)—The Minister of Interior announced to the National Assembly tonight he had authorized French police to fire on Communist deputies shouted "assassin!"

"Troops and police were on the street last night after a day of turmoil during which strikers in two cities demanded that the Government employees begin walking off the job."

The Communist-dominated General Confederation of Labor, meanwhile, hinted the way was open for the strike to spread to other Communist deputies shouted "assassin!"

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Toll Passes 100 Attack Leaves Tel Aviv Burning

JERUSALEM (AP)—Flames swept out of control in an Arab attack on all-Jewish Tel Aviv tonight as the week's deaths in communal fighting in the Middle East passed the 100 mark.

Flames illuminated a five-mile-long battle front centering on an area of the Arab quarter of the city, and spreading to the west and south, and an official announcement said that the death toll had risen to 100.

The death toll in Palestine reached 100 of them Jews, 50 Arabs and 50 British. The British and the Arabs were reckoned officially as 53 Arabs and 47 Jews. Death toll in the week in the three-day Arab assault on the Jewish quarter of the city.

Angry Arabs demonstrated again in Jaffa and Lebanon, two of the seven Arab cities in which representatives will confer Monday in Cairo on means of "defending and liberating" Palestine, which the United Nations voted to cut into Jewish and Arab states.

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Decision Reached GOP Maps Own Inflation Curbs

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Republican Policy Committee decided today to attempt to work out with House members a joint anti-inflation program which may call for voluntary allocation of scarce cost of living items.

Chairman Taft (R-Ohio) told a news conference that a meeting of the committee today would be held next week to determine whether such a program would be passed in the special session of Congress.

He listed measures to extend support controls, regulate the cost of staple buying in the curbs. He said this measure would have discussion by the policy group of a proposed bill under which Government would take the lead in attempts to bring about voluntary agreements in industry to allocate scarce commodities.

ANTI-TRUST CLAUSE
The bill would have to contain a clause exempting participating businesses from the antitrust and Sherman act provisions of Government funds to conduct a campaign.

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Marshal Makes Plea

LONDON (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall urged the Foreign Ministers Council today to "do a good deed" by agreeing to a plan which would help to settle peace terms with Germany.

Marshall attacked Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov's most daily demands for quick creation of a central German government and declared that the occupying powers would be pleased to see the German people.

Marshall led off today's Council discussion on Germany's economic future and his declaration of 1,000 words was handled to reporters shortly after the meeting.

His declaration evidently marked the beginning of the long expected American effort here to determine whether there are solid chances for agreement on the terms of a German government.
