Max Gardner And His Town

WE doubt if any other public figure of our time maintains the relationship with his home town that existed between Max Gardner and Shelby. There was a great deal more to it than the usual sentimental regard a man holds for the place of his birth, And there was a great deal more to it, on the other side, than the usual pride the home folk feel for a local boy wife made good.

In his latter years Max Gardner was much away from Shelby, but Webley, his handsomed do house there, was never some of that word, home-not a retreat, and the word of that word, home-not a retreat, place to spend occasional vacations, or a device to maintain a political foothold in North Carolina, but a house that held his most cherished belongings, and his heart. It could never be said of Max Gardner that

he, like other rich men, assumed the role of patron. It is true that he contributed of patro. It is true that he contributes generously to every worthy cause in Shelby—notably to his church and to Gardner-Webb College. But this was never the grand, enpty gesture of the wealther expatrate. Aways, in addition to money, and much more importantly, Max Gardner gave his time. He worked for Shelby in the gave his time. He worked to Sheap in the spirit of the Chamber of Commerce com-mitteeman, and he did so primarily be-cause his own interests were bound up ir-revocably with the community's.

The people of Shelby accorded him a special sort of respect that had in it none

Until the end of his days he remained Max to his contemporaries, and Mr. Max to younger generations. If they looked up to him—and most of them did—it was because he had earned a high place in Shelby, only incidentally because he also became a powerful influence in Raleigh, Washington and the world at large.
