WORLD WAR II provided a classic example of international co-operation in a common cause, and in its closing months most Americans saw in its basic principle the way to the future.

The delegates to the Asheville convention came from 22 states and they included a manufacturer, a janitor, a corporation lawyer, a poet, a publisher, and a good many educators.

Few Americans now believe that choice exists. Gradually, almost without public discussion, the second alternative has been adopted as official American policy.

The task they have assumed themselves is educational--"the mobilization of public opinion for world government to the end that representatives of the people on legislative bodies will be impelled by the voice of the voters to work for world government."

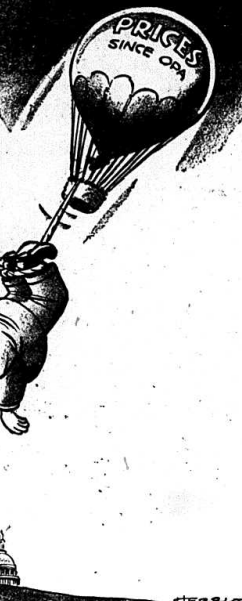
It is ironic that this little band of intellectuals should hold a position so well tested time to the internationalism that has always been a part of the American ideal.

Notes On The Closed Shop Issue

THE STATESVILLE DAILY, commenting upon the anti-closed shop bill now before the Legislature, observes that it is not being offered on behalf of employers, but in the interests of workers.

The closed shop does give the union a considerable advantage in its bargaining with employers. Since it imposes discipline, it helps strengthen the strike threat.

The whole issue, it seems to us, has been badly distorted, and there is little doubt that a great deal of the distortion is deliberate.
