Explosion Set Off As Ship In Gulf Is Afire

More Than 1,000 Reported Injured As City Virtually Wiped Out

TEXAS CITY, Tex.—(AP)—An estimated 350 ps were killed here today in the worst explosion in Te f Coast history. A chain of explosions rocked a h d mile area, and virtually razed this city of 15,000 The Texas Department of Public Safety amountly after noon that reports indicated an estima dead. The injured toll is reported to be over 1,000.

Doctors, nurses, police and firemen from Galvestor Houston and other nearby cities were rushed here.

FRENCH SHIP BLOWS UP

The chain of explosions began on the Grand Camp, rench ship loaded with nitrate. It spread to the mult nillion dollar Monsanto Chemical Corp. plant, now report complete ruin following the explosion and fire.

A death and casualty estimate was made by the week of the transfer of the area, who communications were disrupted by the exploinc communications were disrupted by the exploit the few remaining lines being elogged with emer-calls for help.

The Grand Camp, destroyed with all men aboard by the explosion, according to The Tribune, caught fire today. Several hundred curious gathered at the docks to watch the fire.

When the explosion followed, many on the docks were killed. Steel beams were burled over the city, some star as fifteen miles away.

Many of the dead were Monsato workers.

Port Arthur and Orange, about 100 miles distant, sathe blast was audible there, and buildings rocked.

A Pelly, 27 miles distant, a man said the sound "hurt my eatrums." Palestine, 160 miles from here, claimed to have heard the sound also.

Fires were still raging hours after the explosion, an owater was available to fight them.

Albert Nichols, Harris County sheriff's dispatche said Texas City officials have radioed Fort Crockett, Gaveston, that poison gas was infiltrating the city.

CITIZENS DAZED
