

Eisenhower Urges Hemisphere Defense Co-Operation

Warns That Great Lakes Area Might Be Target

Cites Danger To United States

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower told Congress today that if the United States has another war one of the first things the enemy will do is strike through the air at the industrial centers near the Great Lakes.

"For that reason, it is my chief duty," he said, "to call attention to the fact that the United States and Canadian armed forces are not prepared to co-operate completely."

He declared emphatically, too, that the Western Hemisphere should organize now for defense.

Eisenhower testified before the House Foreign Affairs Committee in support of legislation authorizing the United States aid to standardize the arms of all American nations.

Last week, Secretary of State Marshall, former Army Chief of Staff, told the Senate group he thought the proposed program could be carried out for \$100,000,000 a year.

Eisenhower mentioned no specific cities, but in the Great Lakes region are Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland and other centers which were big producers of the weapons used in defeating Nazi Germany.
