Premier Says Britain Must Take Troops From Nation

Second Appeal For Action Made
LAKE SUCCESS — (AP) — Premier Nokrasy Pasha of Egypt today warned the United Nations Security Council that failure to get British troops out of Egypt may lead to open warfare against the Tommies.

So long as the occupation continues, this popular sentiment cannot be stifled. Such a situation cannot be permitted. The peaceful intentions of my Government will be thwarted."
