A Jolt For U. S. From Europe

T IB to be hoped that Republican stra-legists have been watching the storm signals from Europe in recent days. Specif-ically, their undivided attention should be contered in the new Battle of Britain which rapidly is turning into the Battle of Europe between the forces headed by the United States and Soviet Russia.

This European news is of particular insterest to the Republican command for its
bearing on the foreign policy line which it
will follow in the 1948 Presidential campaign. The trend of events abroad indicates the GOP will have to make large and
difficult decisions in the near future, and
may be forced to revise their calculations
in a quick and dramatic way.

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Thus far the Republicans have exhibited little enthusians for the Marshall Plan for European recovery and have given few indications that they intend to support it with the material and financial assistance that plainly is required. Challenge To North Carolina

GOVERNOR CHERRY has moved swiftly to commit seven Rich Square men, charged with kidnapling in an attempted lynching, to the jurisdiction of Judge J. Paul Frinzelle. As the Governor pointed out, it is not the duty of the grand jury to pass on the facts, or on the innocence or guilt of the accused; the grand jury is required to determine if there is available evidence which should be heard. Since one of the accused even has confessed, there obviously is evidence which should be placed before a petit jury.

Under the circumstances, however, it is not unusual that the grand jury should have freed the alleged kidnapers. Prior to the attempted lynching of Buddy Bush, numerous attacks by Negroes upon white women had occurred in the Rich Square

area; racial feeling was high. Furthermore the seven accused men reputedly a re members of Rich Square's "best families". It was, by all accounts, chiefly fear of local disapproval which prompted the Greenville jury to free the murderers of Willie Earle, There was no reason to believe Northampton jurors would have a more objective outlook; Indeed, the Greensboro Daily News correspondent reported that "for weeks it had been apparent that the community expected" the release of the suspects.

North Carolina understands that Northampton's grand jury would have risked local anger and veneance in returning a true-bill; but it does not relax its insistence that justice be preserved in its courts. The
