Dutch Charge Republican Plot

PARIS — (AP) — United Nations investigators accused The Netherlands today of violating the Indonesian truce agreement.

The Dutch contended they attacked the Indonesian Republic because it was a puppet and had captured secret republican plans for an attack on Netherlands forces.

As the Security Council took up the first withdrawal of troops from Java, the Netherlands received a cable from the UN Good Offices Commission at Batavia, Java.

The Dutch, said the message, violated the Benvue agreement of last January, establishing an Indonesian Republic in Java.

U. S. Suspends Aid To Dutch Indonesia

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States today suspended all military aid to the Netherlands.

It was indicated the move, taken by the Economic Cooperation Administration with State Department approval, is intended to discourage Dutch military action against the Indonesian republic.

More than half of the aid to Indonesia has been in textiles, rice and wheat flour.

The Dutch Ambassador, DeLoe Van Kleffens, denied any request for military supplies.

WARLORD DIES ON GALLOWS

Probe Is Ordered In Duggan Death Fall

NEW YORK — (AP) — Mayor William O'Dwyer today directed New York police to make thorough investigation of the mysterious death of Laurence Duggan.

The mayor acted after receiving a telegram from former Under-Secretary of State Sumner Welles, who said he was convinced of the death of the one-time State Department expert was not a suicide.

The police will seek to find out whether he committed suicide, was the victim of an accident or was the object of foul play.

At the same time, the Federal Bureau of Investigation announced it will not enter the probe of Duggan's death because it is a local police matter.
