America's Future In Business

AT THIS critical moment in 1948, it is AT THIS critical moment in 1948, it is clear that our future—and the future of the entire Western world—depends as never before on American business. Inflation cannot be permanently controlled until there is production which will meet the minimum consumer demand. Production cannot meet the requirements un less America remains healthy and expansive, able to supply the tools and the go od swhich the nations of the world must have it. It is in the label of this situation that the words of two American industrialists, who spoke in Charlotte this week, carry particular urgency. They appeared before a group of business executives yesterday at the Hotel Charlotte, at a conference sponsored by the National Association of Manifacturers and the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce.

Morris Savre, president of the Corn Prod-Morris Sayre, president of the Corn Prod-ucts Refining Company, New York, spoke on the subject, "How Much is Freedom Worth To You?" Don G. Mitchell, president of Sylvania Electric Products Inc., and chairman of the NAM Taxation Committee, discussed "Today's Taxes and Tomorrow's Jobs." Although neither referred directly to recent events in the world economic and political crists, no one could mistake the application of their addresses to the main problem of the hour.

M.R. SAXRE and Mr. Mitchell devoted all their time to explaining details of a plan for America in 1948. It is the National Association's plan. Although it has been assailed by the advocates of government planning as a scheme to fatten the profits of Big Business. It has been worked out much more carefully than the programs currently being advanced by government planning as a scheme without social to the profits of Big Business. It is not without social feetive that should appeal to all Americans. However, the thing which recommends the NAM plan for particular attention at this time is its merit as a practical program for greater production.

Political demangory and the old bugaboo of vested interests' have kept in any Americans. For on considering Intelligently Americans for on considering Intelligently corporations agreemed \$228 billion before taxes last year but few have any idea of where that money went. The actual figures, as given by Mr. Sayre, show that Federal and State corporate income taxes took \$11.1 billion. leaving \$16.9 billion. Dividends paid from the remainder took another \$6.6 billions thave in taxes). That left the corporations with \$10.5 billions.

Bowles Puts Tax Cut First

A CALL for "tax cuts all along the line"
Comes from that Irrepressible New
Dealer, Chester Bowles, former OPA Administrator, with a declaration that American

ministrator, with a declaration that America must plan now to meet the "recession which our past mistakes have made inevitable".

As is noted by this famous advocate of Federal planning for all occasions, The time to cut taxes is when purchasing power is beginning to dry up." Plunging prices in our commodity markets in recent days and a depressed stock market give sufficient point to the timeliness of Mr. Bowles' words.

Mr. Bowles includes his recommendation for a sweeping tax cut in a ninepoint blue-print for a sweeping Federal
program to cushion the effects of the recession he sees just around the corner.
This program calls for a gigantic alum
clearance and housing project; extension
of the Social Security system; establishment of a national health naurance plan;
development of the Missouri Valley Authortiv, the St. Lawrence and valles authors. development of the Missouri Valley Authority, the St. Lawrence and similar authorities on our major rivers: a huge school building program; a minimum wage of "at least 75 centa" and quick approval of the European Recovery Program—all calculated to maintain employment, increase production and speed our social progress. Eight of the nine points in this enormous undertaking would involve large Pederal outlays, wage increases and more payroll

And there's the rub in industrial production, as defined by Mr., Sayre, who says: "The \$10.3 billion of retained profits are utterly inadequate to finance the current business expansion, upon which America's future depends. The Department of Comfuture depends. The Department of Commerce reports that business expenditures, new facilities and new tools have been running at an annual rate between 20 and 25 billion doclars. That 10 billion docean't look so big when you stand it up beside the colossal job it has to do."

The only way in which this deficit in vital venture capital for business expansion can be made up is through tax reduction, particularly reduction of Federal Income taxes.

The NAM contends that we can make an immediate start in the needed reform with a reduction of \$8 billion in the Federal income taxes this year. All classes of tax-payers would share in this relief and it is estimated that about \$3.5 billion of the total would go into private savings, of which more than \$2 billion would be available for venture capital.

Citizens who unthinkably protest that this is a plan designed primarily to benefit Big Business will do well to reflect on their own stake in Big Business. The increased production made possible by lower taxes may be our margin of safety during this period when American industry is carrying the load for half of the world.

It is notable, however, that this celebrated planner now puts Federal tax reduction in the No. I spot on his list. We hope that he keeps first things first in the discussions developing over the right course for America in the present crais. It is dubious that we can obtain agreement on any other points in the Bowles plan except the European Recovery Program before a recession sets in. But there is a chance we can get an agreement on a lax cut, which ceasing the same are the same we can get an agreement on a tax cut, which would do more than any one thing that Mr. Bowles has suggested to check the trend toward recession or to cushion the shock of sudden deflation.

Let's concentrate on what is most prac-tical and politically feasible now. If we do that, and carry out the two points of the Bowles program that seem realizable in the months immediately shead—namely, tax reduction and ERP—perhaps we will find that the recession is not as inevitable as Chester thinks.

OUTSIDERS may well be puzzled. Why should the Central Committee of the Communist Party order Russia's three most effective spokesmen to change their tune? Surely the music of Shostakovitch, Prokoffey. Khatchaturian, is among the chief glories of Soviet culture. Why this sudden official condemnation of it as antidemocratic?

The grounds of the criticism are thoroughly reactionary and "bourgeois," to use the word the Central Committee huris at the erring musicians. It deplores their denial of "the main principles of classic music," their use of "atonality, dissonance and disharmony," their reunciation of "metody," their passion for "a cacophonic and chaotic heaping of sounds." (What must Prokoflev think, who once wrote to this paper that melody is "the main feature of my compositions"?)

This is the sort of criticism we might expect from a non-finusical, "bourgeois" American whose taste had never developed beyond the Tchaikovsky Fifth. But behind its misjudgment is the iron hand of the police state—a deadily weight on a nation's culture. One recalls with norror the heavy, stupid, monumental neoclassicism which was Illiar's believed architectural instruments.
