THE Senate Commerce Committee is cona sidering bills to curb or ban liquor advertising. Senators Reed (R-Ran.) and Edwin C Johnson (D-Colo.) are the authors of measures to restrict such adversising, and Senator Capper (R-Kan.) has another which would in effect outlaw li-

The American Newspaper Publishers As-sociation is protesting the proposed legis-lation. In a letter to Chairman White (R-Me) of the Committee, it is asserted by David W. Howe, ANFA president: "It is the belief of this assertiation that it does not lie within the purview of the Congress to forbid the advertishing of any control of the committee of the congression of the con-sold." Most of the general circuitation maga-zines publish liquor advertising. Some do not. Newspapers vary in their policies as widely as local customs and statutes. The Charlette News does not accept liquor adwidely as local customs and statutes. The Charlotte News does not accept liquor ad-vertising, even though published in a "wet" county, but does publish beer and wine advertising.
