2 Are Killed As Violent Winds Sweep Seven States

Damage Put At Millions In Wake Of Tornadoes

Over 100 Hurt As Storms Hit

Tornadoes and violent windstorms whipped across seven states over the weekend, killing at least 21 persons and injuring more than 100.

Property damage was estimated in the millions.

West Virginia and Kentucky communities were lashed by tornadoes last night. Twisters in Missouri, Kansas and Illinois.

High winds and heavy rains occurred in Indiana and Illinois.

The death toll by states:

West Virginia—two; Kentucky—two; Oklahoma—five; Missouri—three; Kansas—two; Illinois—one.

In West Virginia, tornado winds ripped through six rural communities near Clarkburg in the northern part of the state. The damage reported more than 65 persons were injured.

West Wilford, Lost Creek, Wolf Summit, Mount Clare and Quiet Dell were completely destroyed. Highways were blocked and communication lines were down.

CHURCH SMASHED

In Kentucky a tornado hit Alpha, a town of 140 in Clinton County. The storm wrecked the Davis Chapel Church where an estimated 25 were attending service. At least fifty persons were reported killed or injured. The number of the injured were in the church.

Deputy Policeman Wiley Gregory said that a few houses were destroyed. Alpha is midway between Albany and Middlesboro near the Tennessee border.

Rescue workers sought additional aid in the debris field and mud of the tornado-battered West Virginia communities. Wrecked automobiles, trees and debris from nearby strip-mining operations cluttered U. S. Highway 19 leading to the damaged town of Hupp Hill, W. Va.

The twister hit in West Virginia about 9 P. M. EST.

Three members of the town of Hupp Hill were killed and three were injured in the tornadoes in Oklahoma.

REACT TOWN HIT

A storm struck in the Grand Lake area of northeastern Oklahoma, hitting the resort town of Bernice. At least 10 persons were killed at Bernice. Thirty persons were injured in the Grand Lake area.

Sixty miles south of the Grand Lake area, a twister hit near Kass, killing two persons and injuring five.

Tornado winds whipped across the Lake of the Ozarks in Missouri, damaging hundreds of cottages and houses. Three tornadoes of a fishing lake.

Six Villages Count Five Dead

Steady Rain Pours More Misery On Victims Of W. Va. Tornado

CLARKSBURG, W. Va. —A steady rain poured over the homes of six rural communities in Central West Virginia today, adding to the misery of the victims of the tornado that left five known dead and 31 hospitalized.

Three members of the family died in a Clarkburg home after being pulled from their wrecked automobile. They were identified as Raymond Jr., 36, his wife, 36, and five-year-old Raymond Jr. They were enroute from Clarkburg to Weston where the father is a farm hand.

The body of 16-year-old Mary Magie McGraw, 74, was identified at a funeral home in Weston. A fifth body of a man was identified at the funeral home in Mount Clare. Mrs. Magie McGraw, 45, who was first buried in Clarkburg, was taken to a Clarkburg hospital.

Three-year-old Arthur, who died with his mother, was buried.

Airborne Army Hunt? Russians Display Huge New Planes

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The big four-engine plane that Russia put on display over the weekend may play a new role in its air force's hunt for the arrival of more detailed reports from United States diplomatic observers at the May Day parade before analyzing what the Red Air Force put out for show.

It is likely that at least one of the big planes were the Soviet TU-70, an aircraft bearing close resemblance to the American B-28.

The assumption has been that the Russians copied many of the features of the B-28 known to have been forced down Soviet-controlled areas during the war.

Photographs of the TU-70 indicate it may be a hybrid transport-bomber.

Although its elongated fuselage appears to be a conventional transport design, the plane carries the prestigious nose used by bombers for sighting.

The installation of bomb bay doors if they are not indeed built into the transport version and of bomb bays would be an easy matter of conversion. Russian officials say.
