Ohio Voters Give Senator Taft Margin Over Stassen

Favorite Son Has 14 To 9 Lead in GOP Primary

Ohio voters expressed today to have given their favorite son candidate, Sen. Robert A. Taft, a widening edge over Harold E. Stassen in their tough race for 23 of the state's 53 Republican Presidential delegates.

At a tabulation of the 700,000 ballots counted in the primary held at 11 to 9 in the 23 contested areas. Taft got 30 delegates without opposition.

On the basis of substantially equal unofficial returns, the voting yesterday seemed to have carried Taft candidates to victory in 19 of the 23 contested areas. Taft supporters were leading in three other districts.

Stassen falls short
Comparing with Taft's apparent 14 Stassen apparently had elected seven delegates and his candidates were ahead in two other races for a total of eight. That would be three less than the 12 Stassen had won in the 23 districts.

Ohio Democrats hoped to have close to Arab quarters during the night, broadcasting an appeal in Jerusalem to "live in peaceful cooperation" with the Jews. The Jewish militia urged the Arabs to "shake your hands" with the Jews.

Both the old and new quarters of Jerusalem were comparatively quiet under the British-enforced cease fire order, but there was intermittent shooting throughout the night and morning in the outskirts.

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School Board Takes Action

Coach, Principal Out In Mv. Holly Football Fuss
MOUNT HOLLY — Mount Holly High School will be without a coach and the town's school system will have a principal after June 1 following the climax of a mounting squabble over the site of a football game.

Members of the School Board, meeting last night, failed to reject Coach Dick Thompson and accepted the resignation of Principal F. O. Drummond, effective June 1.

The board's action followed a rift which began last fall when Drummond proposed that the Mount Holly football game be moved from Mount Holly to Belmont because of better seating arrangements and more adequate police protection.

Coach Thompson and many of the students objected to the proposed move, and the contest was eventually canceled.

Later Drummond ordered cancellation of Spring football practice. Last night the School Board, headed by Ray Stroupe, called both Drummond and Thompson into a meeting in an effort to settle the dispute.

When it became known that Thompson had resigned, he was not on the list. Subsequently, the board voted 4-1 to accept Drummond's recommendation that Thompson not be re-elected coach.

Other members of the board are P. J. Davis, C. S. Clegg, R. L. Ward, and Mrs. Bain Henderson.

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Man Robbed, Mutilated

Taft Takes Lead Meeting Proposed On Defense Laws
BURLINGTON — (AP)—Sheriff C. H. Moore said today he was investigating the murder of a man who was carried to a hospital, Lambert.

The Sheriff said Lambert told him this story: "I was hitch-hiking a ride Monday from Burlington. Two Negroes gave me a ride in a car. They were in the woods, where one of them performed the mutilation."

The Negroes then left. Lambert jumped into unconsciousness but retained his senses and made his way to a farm house, from where he was carried to a hospital. Lambert said he was robbed of \$75.
