# Family Of Four Found Slain In Chester County

## Aged Widow And 3 Sons Die In Their Farm Home

**Police Suspect Murder, Suicide**  
CHESTER, S. C. — (AP) — An 85-year-old mother and her three bachelor sons were found cut or shot to death in their home sixteen miles east of Chester today, said Sheriff W. Miller today.

Coroner Lewis H. Miller lashed the death of the five-room farm home. Mrs. Margaret Howze, 85-year-old widow, R. T. Howze, 38, Lucius A. Howze, 35, and Howard Howze, 33, Chief Ernest L. Hostie of Chester County's Sheriff's Office said cursory examinations indicated murder and suicide. He said the bodies were found in the front room of the home.

Rooms blood-spattered Sheriff William A. Peden said rooms of the five-room farm home were blood-spattered. He added that a shotgun and razor were found in separate rooms.

Christoper explained that Lucius Howze came to his home last night and was found by him to be dead. Howze was found through a window and saw the four bodies.

A path of blood led from the back of the house to the front. Two shotgun shells were found in the hallway and one on the floor.

Coroner Miller said the father of the three men died in the house. Howze was shot to death in the house.
