

Compromise Task Given Conference Committee

Congress At Odds Over Bill

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House refused to accept the Senate's \$6,125,710,228 foreign-aid fund today and gave a conference committee the job of working out a compromise.

Rep. Taber (R-NY), an unyielding foe of the Senate amendments which restored most of the foreign

Senator Bridges (R-NH) will head the Senate conferees. He is chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee.

He said the previously - passed House bill, providing millions less for global aid, "sufficient" and demanded a halt to "arbitrary action" to boost the funds.

VOTE 60 TO 9

Taber issued his statement a few hours after the Senate approved the \$6,125,710,228 figure by a 60 to 9 vote at the session lasting into the early hours this morning.

It was Taber who sparked the debate. He said he was "glad to see the Senate take a stand on the issue."

original House drive to slash the aid funds. His statement today bolstered predictions that the House would reject the Senate version. They would leave it up to a joint conference to work out some ac-

Taber also took a couple of cracks at some newspapers and "deluded" columnists who had criticized the House cuts. He termed it a "hys-

"Take for instance," he said, "the sorry spectacle of the New York Herald Tribune. That paper almost had a nervous break-

down over the House action. For several days last week it became nothing more or less than a handbill for well-organized New York pressure groups."

As for some of the columnists, Taber said, "they had taken it for granted that the House would abdicate its functions in order to appease the world-wide relief planners."

The Senate also was criticized again today by Senator Hatch (D-NM) for slashing \$40,000,000 from the U. S. contribution to the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund.

The cut was made after Chairman Bridges (R-NH) of the Appropriations Committee said that 60 per cent of the fund had been going to countries behind the Russian "iron curtain."

Hatch said then, and repeated in the Senate today, that reducing the contribution to the "pitiful sum" of \$20,000,000 was a "grave mistake."

Both Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) and Secretary of State Marshall had urged the Senate to restore all of the House cuts. Vandenberg charged that the House leadership was "treasonous."

voice vote it approved a \$3,686,733-250 appropriation for the Navy starting July 1. This measure also goes back to the House for action on a Senate boost of more than \$125,000,000.

Earlier the Senate also had disposed of a \$43,422,061 Government corporations bill which carried among other things, a \$30,972,061 appropriation for the Tennessee Valley Authority.
