INDIA WANTS WHITE MUFFLED

Scientists Embarrassed Ethiopia Demands Redress Of 'Insult'

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Ethiopian Legation in London demanded punishment of persons responsible for the "insult" suffered by Minister Ras Imru at a science meeting here Monday.

Imru was asked to move from his seat in the diplomatic section while attending a meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science at Constitution Hall. He thereupon left the hall, the legation said, in protest against such an insult.

The note sent to the State Department yesterday said:

"The Ethiopian Government considers the offense to its accredited representative as grave and prone to create serious implications, especially so because the offense occurred in a public place and in the presence of the President of the United States.

"The Imperial Ethiopian Legation, therefore, demands that the United States Government will take appropriate measures to repair the damage and to punish the offender in the manner that the dignity and inviolability of an envoy representing a sovereign government requires."

The science group, which Wednesday sent the Minister an expression of its "profound regret" and "acute embarrassment" over the incident, said:

Imru was asked to change his seat by an usher who acted on the instructions of an unnamed woman.

Cease Fire Order Given By Nizam In Short War

New Government
Will Be Formed

NEW DELHI (AP)—The Hyderabad Government radio broadcast today that the princely state has yielded in its 100-hour war with the Dominion of India.

The Moleen Nizam, ruler of the state, offered a cease fire effective 10:30 A. M. and accepted the resignation of his government. He informed India he will form a new government tomorrow.

Mir Laik Ali, the Nizam's Premier, announced this in the Hyderabad broadcast. The broadcast was in the Urdu language and in English. It was picked up by the Indian Government radio at Nagpur. The Government awarded a full text before reaching a decision, a spokesman said.

Officials reports reaching here from Poona, Madras and Nagpur said Indian troops already had marched into Hyderabad City, the capital, and Secunderabad, a military cantonment six miles north of the capital, without opposition. Official confirmation was awaited here at headquarters.

India declared at the outset she was marching into Hyderabad to put down a state of anarchy.

The Indian commander, Lt. Gen. Maharajah Shri Rajendrasinhji, three hours before Hyderabad announced, had broadcast a demand to the Hyderabad commander to "lay down your arms, since resistance is futile."

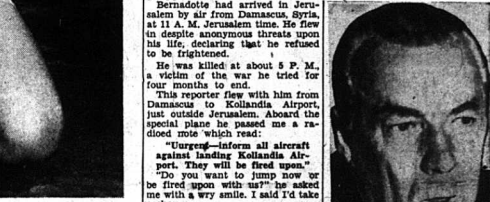
Four Men Attack Party In Jerusalem

Mediator In Palestine Strife
Ignored Threats; Aide Killed

AMMAN, TRANS-JORDAN (AP)—Count Folke Bernadotte and a French aide were shot to death today in the Jewish-held part of Jerusalem.

The mediator and French Col. Serot were killed by "men in Jewish army uniforms," said a telephone message to the Associated Press here.

(John Joseph MacDonald, the American Consul at Jerusalem, reported to Washington that Bernadotte's party was ambushed by four men, "presumably the Stern Gang," Jewish extremists. U. S. Col. Frank Begley, UN security officer, was reported slightly wounded in the face when he

The Count was a nephew of King Gustav of Sweden. He was one of the most genuine men of his age who has produced. His associates often said the key to his character was his "complete integrity."

He was profoundly religious, but also gay and charmingly in manner. At a Swedish dinner he once played a most active role in the "bunker" during the negotiations with Germany. He made many hazardous trips into Germany, some during the heaviest bombings of Berlin.

He was responsible for many morale measures during Sweden's mobilization when war threatened. He headed the Swedish equivalent of the USO. He also was active in Boy Scout work, training them in aircraft spotters and medical assistance.

Patrols Increased

Allies Tighten Up Counter-Blockade

BERLIN (AP)—The Western Allies tightened their counter-blockade of the Russian zone today to shut off the last flow of goods from Germany to the East.

Patrols were increased at crossing points along the length of Bismarck's frontier with the Soviet zone to halt any Eastbound freight on the highways.

British transport authorities said that military trucks were taken through Bismarck.

The Russian-licensed newspaper News Deutschland carried a page resolution passed by SED members at a meeting last night attacking the Bonn meeting.

SOVIETS PATROL
Soviet jeep patrols were in force in the blockade city yesterday as western sector anti-Communists held funeral services for a sixteen-year-old youth killed in a bloody fighting after last Thursday's anti-Soviet march.

No trouble resulted from the incursions into American territory, although a Soviet soldier fired one shot over the head of a German thief near the U. S. sector.

SED leaders charged that the Bonn meeting was "against the Soviet live friendship with the Soviet Union."

The statement declared the parliamentary council "is employed by a capitalistic monopoly of the United States."

"The parliament of dividers at Bonn make an appeal to humanity for liberty," the resolution said.

The Socialist Unity Party, flaily rejects the assumption and warns the German people not to be misled by the Bonn meeting.

The statement wound up with several militant slogans including: "Long live friendship with the Soviet Union."

FUGGING LEAS

The Western counter-blockade has patched sharply the economy of the Soviet zone.

At Helmslet, major control point between the British and American zones, police were increased by 100, and police at the highway points were boosted from eight to 24. The amplified guard forces have been given strict orders to stop any shipments of goods eastward.

'Course Of Action' Counterattack On Communist Drive For Asia Power Mapped

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States pressed a sharp counterattack today against a Communist drive for Asian power, mapping a strategic quarter of the world—Southeast Asia.

With a pointed reference to the Soviet Union, the State Dept. indicated yesterday it is giving the colonial peoples of Indonesia, India, China and Malaya, and among the citizens of Independent Burma.

Story Of John Stade

Tragedy Ends Fight
Against Handicap

CHICAGO (AP)—John Stade, although physically handicapped, didn't like to stand on the sidelines when his companions played athletic games.

John was stricken by infantile paralysis fourteen years ago when he was less than two years old. The disease twisted his right leg and partly crippled his right hand.

But he never lost his childlike determination to be "like the other boys" and compete in games. He worked desperately at playing baseball, basketball and other games with his schoolmaster.
