BERLIN — (AP) Gen. Lucius D. Clay said today the failure of Russian tactics in trying to swing the population of Berlin to Communism "must be apparent even to the Soviet Government."

U.S. Income A New Peak

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Individual income jumped \$1,100,000,000 in November to hit a new record annual rate of \$13,700,000,000, the Commerce Department reported today.

That rate, if maintained, points that revenue will be the highest ever carried in the President's budget message today, Mr. Truman said. It is the highest since the 1930 fiscal year beginning July 1 and the 1930 fiscal year beginning July 1.

The President's revenue estimates were based on the assumption that individual income would remain at the \$13,000,000,000 level in 1949, the October-December period.

Even that income rate caused the President's new figure on revenue for fiscal 1949 to go \$1,600,000,000 over the forecast he made five months earlier. It is a \$115,000,000 increase from the \$12,585,000,000 income base then in use.

FARM INCOME UP
The Commerce Department said that about half of the income increase occurred in farmers' income, which went up as the volume of farm output rose during a season when it usually is falling.

Increases in Government pay and in dividends and interest accounted for the rest of the rise, the department said. It also noted that there were also increases in construction and farm output.

Private wage and salary payments were practically unchanged from the previous month. Total wage and salary receipts, including Government payments, at the rate of \$3,000,000,000 a year, accounted for \$135,000,000 of the personal income total.

The total figure includes net income of unincorporated business, net rents received by landlords, and interest and dividends. It also includes net income of wage earners and farmers.

The number of total was seven and one-half per cent above a year ago. For the first three months of 1948, the total was nine per cent above the same period of 1947 and at a \$21,000,000,000 level.

'Economy' Drive Reason For Move

Cancellation of the proposed 500 bed general medical hospital at Charlotte for treatment of war veterans was announced today in Washington in consequence of an "economy" program advocated by President Truman's budget message to the Congress.

At the same time, the Washington headquarters of the Veterans Administration said it had announced the drastic curtailment in hospital construction authorizations would necessitate abandonment of three other big projects in the two Carolinas.

These are:

281 bed psychoneurotic hospital at Salisbury.

300 bed general medical hospital at Greenville, S. C.

300 bed general medical addition to the Veterans Hospital at Raleigh.

The proposed hospital at Charlotte was authorized about three years ago when the total estimated at \$2,000,000. Architects and engineers prepared construction drawings and specifications which were approved tentatively, but the start of construction was deferred. 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President's Figures Go To Congress

Estimates For Year Beginning July 1 Add Up To Biggest Peacetime Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman gave the American people today their prospective bill for Government for the coming year: \$41,858,000,000 plus.

The budget he submitted to Congress for the 12 months beginning next July 1 is the largest ever in peacetime. It figures out to \$282.82 for each man, woman and child in the country.

The plus—an amount to be disclosed—will be money to help Western Europe, and perhaps some other nations, arm themselves. Mr. Truman said he will ask for that later.

Like the remaining project, many of the billions in the regular budget are due to the cold war with Russia about half of it is made up of costs of the Armed Forces and of foreign aid programs.

In presenting the budget, Mr. Truman renewed his request for increased taxes, citing among other things the still-living project of rearming Western Europe.

Even in the absence of that, the Chief Executive declared, the nation's fiscal needs for 1950 piled up to a \$600,000,000 deficit only for 1949—unless taxes are raised.

Solely Mr. Truman declared that future budget for 1950 will be to meet America's mounting responsibilities in the world and to pay for a greatly expanded military establishment at home.

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
