Now THAT the Mecklenburg County grand jury has indicted Magistrate J. S. Turner for extortion, malfeasance in office, and failure to make his reports properly, we may expect the whole story of his midnight "kangaroo court" to be brought out into the open and given a needed airing.

The first grand jury report on Magistrate Turner told in some detail of his burst of activity late last Fall when, in a period of six weeks, he tried 70 defendants in gambling cases, all of them Negroes, and found them all guilty when he didn't have legal jurisdiction over gambling in the first blace.

But the report failed to answer one question: Was this a scheme to collect fees?
Or was Magistrate Turner simply ignorant
of the fact that he does not have jurisdiction over gambling?

# Cold War Costs U. S. Dearly

YOU get a startling view of the deadly struggle with Russia in President Truman's figures. He gave them, ice-cold, to Congress this week: The cost of paying the Government's expenses another year.

He asked for almost \$42 billion and more than half of it, about \$21 billion, is for national defense and foreign sid. Lift the edges of those figures, look be-hind them, and you can see a picture; past, present and future.

THE FAST

After the war there was an enormous need in this country for everything from new trolley cars to new toasters. Economists called it the pent-up demand from the war. It was big enough to keep the country prosperous for some years.

In time-if we had nothing else to worry about, such as Communism—supply would catch up with demand. Then would come the very serious problem of leveling off, or trying to keep people employed and the country from allding into depression.

This leveling off—if there had been nothing else to worry about—might have gotten under way about 1988 and given us a chance to try to get back to normal the country from the countr

mal. But—
The leveling off didn't have a chance to start.
Communism had become a threat to all Burope and to
as. So we had to start pouring money, resources, and
manner—thio national defense and foreign aid.

THE PRESENT.

For the coming year Mr. Truman is asking about \$21 billion for national defense and foreign aid, which that, Government costs would be about \$31 billion. The difference there undoubtedly would have meant a big saving in taxes for you. But there's something else:

About ten per cent of what we produce here is going into national defense or foreign die not reaching a natural level, the leveling-off period mentioned above. And that's designs the answer to the critical question: How will we do when, and if, the leveling starts?

But there is something else: Because of the money, resources and work going into national defense and foreign aid, were living in a bit of pumped up prosperity. And—how long caw this keep up?
