U.S. STEELWORKERS VOTED

Big Three Ministers Last Major Tak Common Policy Holdout in Peace Move

PARIS — The big three ministers of the United States, Britain and France have agreed today to endorse a common policy toward Yugoslavia and Communist China. The three ministers met in a two-day session here. An American official reported it covers "a wide range of subjects," with Germany topping the list. The big three ministers then took up a memorandum from West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

The ministers agreed to examine all aspects of the German question — political, economic, psychological and military — and the issue of Germany's entry into the European community and other international bodies.

The three Western ministers were to discuss the German question, they might lead to Yugoslavia, to enable Premier Marshal Tito to maintain his independence from the Kremlin. They also were to consider problems involved in recognition of the Chinese Communist regime.

Miners While Taks Go On

Lewis Threatens To Resume Tieup If Agreement Not Reached By Dec. 1

CHICAGO — (AP) — John L. Lewis today dramatically called off the crippling soft coal strike until Nov. 30. The strike could start again Dec. 1.

In a sweeping reversal of the miners' traditional "no contract—no work" policy, the chief of the United Mine Workers ordered his 380,000 men back to work immediately, pending new settlement efforts.

District presidents who met here with Lewis said some miners would be back on the job at midnight tonight. "This would start relieving immediately a coal shortage that has become critical in many parts of the country."

Lewis said the three weeks strike truce is "an act of good faith, designed to contribute to public convenience." He lambasted the operators as "arrogant and brutal."

Between now and Nov. 30, Lewis said, the union "will participate in such wage conferences as may eventuate in conformity with recognized policy."

If no agreement is reached during the truce period, he added, the miners will resume their strike.

N. N. Leader Asks Atomic Armistice

LAKE SUCCESS — (AP) — UN Atomic President Cordell H. Rumsfeld announced today he has accepted the Big Three leaders' call to consider a short-term atomic armistice, a ban on use of atomic bombs and a new start on the problem of atomic control.

Rumsfeld has not received official answers from the big three governments but western delegates were reported to view the proposals as old stuff and vague.

Sources close to the Philippine delegate said, however, that he was studying the proposals as a thorough study in the General Assembly of the United Nations.

His plan was published as the United States prepared to launch a "Soviet Union" of the atomic issue in the Assembly's special political committee.

Nevertheless, complete returns from the actual balloting showed Lehman winning with 55 per cent of the vote, and Dulles with 45 per cent.
