### Russia in Final Blast At West

Malik Charges Anti-Peace Plot  
NEW YORK (AP)—The United Nations assembly adjourned its 1949 session at 1:21 P. M. (EST) today after hearing Russia's attack on the Western powers of a "black plot" against peace.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Jakob A. Malik scolded the "war-mongers" in the midst of the customary round of congratulatory speeches at adjournment time. He termed the assembly's work "unsuccessful" and said the Russians call plans for a new war. He said Russia stands for peace and will continue to stand for peace.

Assembly President Carlos P. Romulo told the delegates he felt the past three years had been a period of substantial improvement on the situation that has prevailed over the past three years.

"We have moved forward," he said, "to a point where the world is now in a position to make a step-by-step assumption of real negotiations between both sides. This in itself is a significant improvement on the situation that has prevailed over the past three years."

The assembly voted decisively last night to set up an international commission to study the situation of the Arab and Jewish occupying powers.

The 1949 assembly in its final session appropriated \$25,000,000 to finance the international commission at the outset, Israeli and U.N. troops in the area.

Israel will fight by a resolution said King Abdullah of Hashemite Jordan had told his Arab subjects that the question would rule the old wall of part of the Arab world.

### Assembly Session Closes Reds Rapidly Taking Remainder Of China

BONG KONG.—The Communists lost all but three major cities in China proper today. They were ready to give up one of those—namely, Hainan Island—just as soon as they could complete its evacuation.

The other two are Sichuan, in Szechwan province—virtually surrounded and worthless; and the Kweichow province, Hainan Island. The Reds are reported preparing to attack on the peninsula to prevent Nationalist troops from fleeing to Hainan.

These were the last developments in the Communist drive in China. The Nationalist garrison at Kunming—an estimated 40,000 troops—was ordered to evacuate the city and to proceed to Yunnan, for the Red army was closing in on the city.
