\$2,000 Stolen, Robber Escapes

CLOVER, S. C.—A lone gunman walked into the Bank of Clover about 11:30 o'clock today, forced a teller to hand over an estimated \$2,000 in cash and then backed out through the front door before nearby bank officials knew anything unusual had happened.

The man reportedly drove away in a red automobile and headed toward Gastonia.

He carried out his robbery so quickly, bank officers said, that he left several thousand dollars in cash reposing behind the counter.

Police throughout this area were alerted by a red or maroon car, thought to be a Ford coupe.

Luther Hogler, teller at the front part of the bank, said he scooped up the money from the cash drawer and handed it over to the man.

W. Herbert Smith, a vice-president of the bank, said the man left down his gun on the counter for a few seconds while he took the money.

There was another customer when the robbery took place.
