Two Killed, 25 Injured In Storms

Property Damage Reported High

The greatest damage was to the first two—Canton, a town of 1,200, and Muskogee, Okla., a town of 1,000. The dead were in Canton and Muskogee.

Buildings Wrecked

At Longdale the damage was not as heavy as in Muskogee, but the business buildings were demolished and many houses damaged—but none were killed.

Both the dead were killed in their homes. The first strike was the first strike by the tornado here. The frame structure was crushed.

Relief came quickly to Muskogee from other towns, and by midnight the city was back to normal. The problem of housing and feeding the thousands of homeless was met in Muskogee.
