CHAPLAIN HILL — Professors of the University of North Carolina next year may be asked to sign a statement saying they are not Communists.

Big 4 Seek Solutions On Austria, Germany

PARIS—(P)—The Big Four Council of Foreign Ministers met today in an attempt to solve the problems of Germany and decided to add to the Austrian question to their agenda.

The four ministers agreed on a four-point agenda: 1. Problems of Germany unity, including economic and political principles and allied (four-power) control.

2. Berlin, including currency questions. 3. Preparation of a peace treaty for Germany.

4. Preparation of an Austrian independence treaty. The Austrian question has been discussed over many a long meeting and Austria has begged the council to take it up at this session.

The first meeting of the current session lasted until 3:30 P. M. (10:30 P. M. EST) or about two and a half hours.

4 Year-Old Kills Man In Cabarrus

Wife Spurned Farmer-Husband

MT. PLEASANT — Cabarrus County Deputy Sheriff C. R. Cook said a 37-year-old farmer shot his wife to death today because she would not live with him, then forced his four-year-old son to kill him.

Cook said Victor Lee Talbert visited his wife at their farm near here about 11 o'clock this morning and learned her "she took him back."

When she refused, he pumped six slugs from a .22 caliber rifle into the mother of seven while she stood on the front porch of the farm house.

Talbert carried his wife into the bedroom, where he lay on the bed. Cook said, that she had been crying and shouting for help.

The boy pulled the trigger and killed his father, Cook said, as his five-year-old sister, Nadine, watched.

Three other children lived at home with their mother, Mrs. C. R. Talbert, who was 37 years old. One of them, Jack, eight, was at school.

Two other children, Mary and J. C., fourteen, were working in the field. The mother and her children operated the John Deere farm three miles south of Mt. Pleasant.
