

Federal Court Jury Ponders Judith Coplon's Fate

Move For Mistrial Is Denied

Bitterness Marks Final Arguments

WASHINGTON (AP)—The federal court jury in the case went to a Federal Court jury at 9:55 A. M. (EST) today.

The jury retired to decide the case of the former Justice Department worker after listening to instructions by Federal Judge Albert L. Reeves on points of law.

The judge spoke for 25 minutes, before the jury began its deliberations. The judge's intent was a major point for the jury's consideration.

Palmer argued that Kelley's appeal was based on "passion and prejudice."

"I deny the motion," Judge Reeves said as Palmer finished his argument.
