Ex-President Continues Trip Hoover Stricken Ill On Train

OGDEN, Utah (AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover was stricken with an internal disorder aboard a train early today but after medical examination continued his trip to New York.

The dispatcher for the Southern Pacific Railroad said the company physician examined the former President and decided that the disorder was not serious enough to require hospitalization.

Mr. Hoover was aboard the steamliner, City of San Francisco, transferring here from Southern Pacific tracks to continue the eastbound journey.

The train was halted for 30 minutes earlier this morning at Elko, Nev., where Dr. Dale Hadfield examined the former President and decided that the disorder was not serious enough to require hospitalization.

On the basis of his examination, Southern Pacific officials had an ambulance here to meet the train.
