## Senator Asks Vaughan Intervened For Breweries

### Probe Figures To Testify Next Week Hoe To Call Vaughan Maragon

Major General Harry H. Vaughan, John Maragon and other central figures in the five-percentage investigation are expected to testify next week before a Senate subcommittee, Sen. Claude R. Hoey said today.  
The North Carolina Senator, chairman of the subcommittee, told The News by telephone from his home in Shelby that his group expects to hear directly from the President's aide, from James V. Hunt and Major General Vaughan. He said he hopes he will be able to conduct the hearing by the end of next week.  
Whether Hunt will appear before the committee depends upon his health, Sen. Hoey said. The business counselor, whose reputation for being "influenced" in obtaining Government contracts touched off the sensational hearing, has been in recent weeks.

### 'No Connection' With Maryland Discovery Fying Saucers Still Mystery

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force said today that two old maid pilots flying in a Maryland tobacco shed yesterday "have absolutely no connection with the reported sightings of flying saucers."  
The announcement ended speculation that the contraptions may have been early experimental models of the strange objects that through the air from time to time.  
Special agents made an investigation of the Bolling Airfield, and advised that "some flying discs" were found in Maryland. State officials said the discs were about 18 inches in diameter and were made of metal. They were found near Glen Burdick, Md., about seven miles from Washington.

### Customs Officials Seize Dolls For European Kids

PITTSBURGH (AP)—More than a hundred dolls destined for needy children in Europe have been impounded here by U. S. customs inspectors. The Government wants duty paid on the dolls.  
The dolls were contributed by children of St. Catherine's, Ont., to the Red Cross campaign. The dolls were made by the children and were to be placed in storage until they are claimed by a child overseas.  
"After they are claimed and the people estimate a valuation, we will fix the amount of duty," a customs official said today.
