Walkout Set To Begin At Midnight

No Break Seen In Deadlock

PITTSBURGH — (AP) — A Government mediator trying to stave off a nationwide steel strike at midnight said today "There is no basic change in the positions" of Big Steel and the CIO.

William W. Margolis, assistant director of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, said in a comment to reporters after he had spent more than three hours talking with both sides.

When asked what he meant by "basic," Margolis said it had no particular significance in the words of the negotiators.

Anthrax Output To Be Resumed

Western Miners Also Get Word

One-fifth of the country's coal miners got orders to get back to work today. But the rest will stay out on strike.

President John L. Lewis of the United Mine Workers told 80,000 anthracite miners and 22,000 coal diggers west of the Mississippi to resume production next Monday on their usual five-day week.

Around 40,000 soft coal miners in the West, South and Midwest will carry on the walkout they started Sept. 18 after suspension of payments into their pension fund.

TALKS DEADLOCKED

Their negotiations with operators are at a standstill and there is no sign of a break.

Lewis sent out a telegram which said:

"The suspension of mining in the western and anthracite areas is not now vital to the health of the nation."
