Diggers Told To Work On 3-Day Week

WASHINGTON—(AP)—John L. Lewis today ordered 66,000 striking coal miners to go back to a three-day work week Monday.

There were 16,000 men in seven states—requiring their job even the three days weekly permitted by Lewis in his "cold war" with mine operators.

Operators have taken the view that this checkerboard strike pattern is part of the bargaining tactics Lewis is using in his battle for higher wages and welfare benefits for his miners.

They look on the three-day work week as a direct challenge. As they see it, Lewis is trying to cause the operators all the difficulty he can while making the thing to the point where the government would be forced to intervene.
