## WHY THE EXTRA \$3,800 FOR PARKING METERS?

**A**T THE very core of the Council-Manager form of city government is the principle that the Council shall decide matters of policy and the City-Manager shall execute that policy.

This week the Council stepped over into the City Manager's province in the purchase of parking meters.

It is of some concern to the people of Charlotte that the Council, on its own initiative, overrode the recommendation of a panel of qualified experts without apparent good reason.

It is also of some concern to the people that the Council, in so doing, spent an extra \$3,800 of public funds.

Here is what happened:


The City Manager, with the unanimous endorsement of three City officials, recommended that a contract for 400 new parking meters be awarded to the Michaels Art Metal Co., at a cost of \$50 per meter or a total cost of \$20,000. This type, known as the Mico Meter, is universally used in Charlotte at present.

Substantial Council sentiment developed for awarding the contract to the Duncan Parking Meter Co., makers of the Miller Meter, at \$65 per meter, or a total of \$22,500.

After some discussion, during which City Manager Yancey appealed his recommendation, a compromise motion by Mr. Daugherty, seconded by Mr. Boyd, passed unanimously. It provided for the purchase of 200 Mico Meters and 200 Miller Meters at a total cost of \$23,500.

The three City officials who had endorsed the lower price meters were City Purchasing Agent C. E. Beatty, City Treasurer L. E. Ledbetter, who is in charge of equipment, purchasing and collecting money therefrom, and City Traffic Engineer Herman Hoese, who is responsible for the placing and timing of the meters.

As is customary in making all City purchases, these three endorsements were given after critical comparison of the two meters (including a complete break-down and rebuilding by an expert repairman), their durability, the quality of the materials and workmanship, the ease of replacement and collection, the cost of replace-

ment parts, a comparison of operations with other cities, and interview with representatives of both companies.

There was no doubt that the more expensive meter is a good meter. These three officials did not, however, believe it was worth \$18—or 38 per cent—more. Neither did Mr. Yancey, who reviewed their findings and added his own endorsement.

In spite of that, the Council decided to try 200 of the more expensive meters, at the extra cost to the people of \$3,800. Mr. Yancey voted for the motion, told Mr. Boyd that the Miller Meter "looks like a more substantial meter," that "it seemed to be superior," that "it is used extensively in other cities," and that "it appears we were getting more or less to a monopoly in buying meters from just one company."

Giving the Council credit for all the publicity in the world, it still appears to us that:

1. Quality and service being equal, a low bidder should always receive public awards;

2. It is a bad precedent to override recommendations of men experienced in the operation of such equipment, and especially to assume the prerogatives of the City Manager; and

3. In these days of rising government costs, \$3,800 of the people's money should not be spent just to satisfy Councilmanic curiosity.

## VIRGINIA'S SCHOOL PROGRAM

**U**IN THE commonwealth to our north, the lines are forming for a battle over State grants for local school buildings not unlike the tussle in the 1948 session of the North Carolina General Assembly.

Virginia's new Governor John Battle favors a \$48,000,000 aid to schools program the money being handed over to localities with no strings attached. He apparently has strong legislative support.

Governor Battle's successor in the State Senate, Edward O. McCuskey of Charlottesville, has criticized the program as starting a trend to a "paternalistic state." He has served notice he will fight for an alternative plan that would compel localities to put up \$40 for each \$60 received from the State.

The Richmond Times-Dispatch, an ever alert advocate of economy in government and a staunch believer in local responsibility, has lined up with Mr. McCuskey, pointing out that "even the Federal Government, so loudly and properly criticized in many instances by our 'organization' friends, has always insisted that its grants for buildings be on a 'cost sharing' basis only." Battle's proposal, the paper adds, runs "counter to the very principle of local responsibility and local self-government which is supposed to have been for years a cardinal principle of the Byrd 'organization'."

**POOR LITTLE RICH GIRL**

NINE-YEAR-OLD Lora Lee Michel isn't having any fun. She's making a godly sum of money for appearing in movies, to be sure, but that doesn't appeal to her.

"I don't want to be in the movies. I want to eat and play like other kids. I don't care without worrying whether I get my knees scratched," she said.

The occasion was an interview after a closed court custody hearing in Los Angeles. In court she claimed she was won over when she didn't stay on a diet, that the movie stars had too much and gained weight.

Arraigned in the case was Mrs. Lorraine Michel, 36. She was charged with child mistreatment. She and her husband adopted the child five years ago.

Such a case as this causes most of us to wonder anew about the time-honored land of Hollywood, about the peculiar values that give rise to such a situation.

The life of most adults turned up in the world of celluloid seems to bear little relation to that of the millions whom they "entertain" in the movie houses of the nation. But what must the lives of the "juveniles" be like? How are they affected by the unending pressure on them to be "cute" and perfect and, above all, as like as peas in a pod?

Must they all fit the classic Shirley Temple mold? Must they cultivate unnatural "baby talk" voices? Must they conform in gesture and expression to the kewpie-doll concept of Hollywood?

North Carolina, already well into a \$50,000,000 State school building program, will watch with considerable interest the Virginia battle. Although the program in this State does not require matching grants, it differs in one other respect: half of the \$50,000,000 was allocated by the General Assembly from the postwar "cushion" fund; the other half, to be borrowed by issuing State bonds, was authorized by a vote of the voters last June.

Thus the voters of North Carolina approved the departure from past policy which has held counties responsible for school buildings. It was not entirely a decision by the General Assembly.

The people's right to decide such questions is supreme. Though we still have reason to think that this new breach in the already thin line of local responsibility has been made, it at least was condoned by the people.

Furthermore, the State Board of Education in North Carolina maintains tight control over all school building projects, and we have already had ample evidence that the Board is making sure that the State money is being used wisely.

Through these two points—approval by the people, control over the spending of the money—are not presently at issue in Virginia, we suggest them as two useful checks on the trend toward a "paternalistic state."
