McMullan Rules On Teacher Pay Bonus

RALEIGH—(AP)—Governor Harry McMullan ruled today that only school personnel holding "A," "B" or graduate certificates are entitled to share in continuing pay increase provided by the 1949 Legislature.

Under this ruling, approximately 1200 teachers who hold "C" certificates, elementary "A" certificates or non-standard certificates will not receive the increase.

The Legislature said the increase should provide "A" certificate teachers with an annual pay scale ranging from \$1,800 to \$3,000. Holders of "B" and "C" certificates would be increased in proportion to this. This would give an "A" certificate teacher with no experience an increase of \$138 and an "A" certificate teacher with 15 to 20 years experience \$246.

Geo. Bernard Shaw, Aged Playwright, Is Near Death

AYOT ST. LAWRENCE, Eng.—(AP)—George Bernard Shaw, 84-year-old English playwright, is believed to be near death.

The doctor called on the 84-year-old playwright at 8:30 A.M. (3:34 A.M. EST). Later he held reporters back for a conference.

An earlier doctor's bulletin, issued at 8 A.M., said Shaw had a "moderate" night "but his condition is serious."

Shaw's physician, Dr. P. C. Fry, said later:

"The bulletin is that he is uncomatose. I can make no further statement on that, but he shall be calling on him again at lunch time."

At 11 A.M. (8 A.M. EST), eight hours after he lapsed into unconsciousness, Shaw's breathing had become heavy and labored.

"This is the finish," said a member of his household, who would not be named.

Shaw had been getting weaker since operations were done early in the week to put together a thigh bone he broke when he slipped in his garden.

This, complicated with bladder trouble, contributed to his decline.

The last night Shaw was reported running a high fever. At times he did not even recognize his long-time nurse.

Virginia-born Viscountess Astor, an old friend, drove out from London to spend an hour at his bedside last night, stroking his brow to soothe him.

"I want to see him," he told her.

Stassen Picked For GOP Reply

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Republican leaders were reported today to have chosen Hiram H. Stassen, 1948 Presidential aspirant to reply for their party to President Truman's Saturday night radio campaign speech.

Stassen, Saturday night radio addresser of the University of Pennsylvania, said Senator Arthur W. Vandenberg (R-Mich.) begged-off from undertaking the job.

Vandenberg's office in Grand Rapids, Mich., said he told GOP leaders he was sorry but he could not do it because of doctor's orders. His health has been poor for months.

The choice then of Stassen was reported to have been made by a committee consisting of National Chairman Charles W. Gabrielson, the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee Chairman Rep. Leo Leonard (W. Ill.) and W. Hall Rorvick, Republican House Campaign Chairman.

Stassen was reported scurrying around for the \$15,000 which would be needed to hook up one network (probably Mutual) and to buy a four-network address by the President, which will cost the Democratic National Committee \$50,000.

The Democratic committee announced last night that Mr. Truman's address, to be broadcast from St. Louis, will be carried by one of the largest radio and television networks in history—nearly 1,200 radio and 76 television stations.

Germany Will Have No Army
