send. Most Americans recall the history of Vorld War II. In the three prewar years, 1938 through 1840, there were 2,772, 2,613 and 2,508 work stoppages respectively. In 941, the number climbed to 4,288. In 1942, here were 2,508 strikes; in 1943 there were, 7,52; in 1944 the peak of 4,856 was reg-

istered, and in the last war year, 1945, the number decreased only slightly, to 4,750. In each of the war year, there was a greater number of strikes than in any of the three normal prewar year. It is true that there was some decrease

It is true that there was some decrease in the total number of idle man-days dur-ing the four war years, but this was mainly due to the fact that defense indus-tries couldn't afford to hold out against their demands. The boys got what they
