## ATLANTA SHOWS THE WAY

THE Korean War and the U. S. defense I program may cause delays in the nationwide urban redevelopment program envisioned by the Sist Congress. But the uncertainty ham't bothered at least one Southern city—Atlanta.

Last week-end the Atlanta Housing Authority announced plans for a multi-million dollar project to clear out and redevelop some 180 blocks of slum areas. In place of the slums there will be new industrial and commercial areas, new white and Negro housing, schools, streets, and other public facilities.

First that city asked for and got a reservation of \$270,000 (Charlotte reserved \$747,000). Then the Metropolitan Planning Commission and the City Planning Commission apent a year studying the general areas for defunds.

Chariotte's situation is somewhat dir-ferent. The North Carolina Coeneral Assem-bly has not yet passed an enabling act authorizing telles in this state to partici-pate in the redevelopment program. Such a measure has been prepared by the N. C. League of Municipalities and the State Real Estate Board, and will be presented to the 1951 session. It should pass easily. Not until the law is on the books can the Charlotte Urban Redevelopment Com-mission move in the direction Atlanta has chosen-When that time comes, Cherlotte, like Atlanta, must not hesitate because of the uncertain international situation, but must move ahead swiftly to present the City Council with a detailed project.
